Div 58 - Ancestral Home, Barn or Homestead Photograph - Blue Ribbon to Melissa O'Brian

The John T. Curl Family Home in Indianola circa 1916.



John Thomas "JT" Curl (1854-1918) was born in Brimfield, Peoria, ILL, one of eleven children of Remembrance Hughes Curl sr (1822-1900) and Emeline ANDERSON (1820-1916). JT married Sarah Jane "Jennie S" WOOD (1855-1938), daughter of Mary LONGLAND Wood Elliott, (1825-1920) and Henry Wood (1825-1861) of Brimfield. And they were the parents of my grandma, Maud Elizabeth CURL Kiphart (1884-1967), and the grandparents of my mother Margaret Marie KIPHART Johnson (1923-2008). Both Maud, born in White Oak township, and Margaret were Warren co. Iowa farm born and raised girls.

This Victorian home is found in various photographs from the 4 or 5 photo albums that grandma K always had in the front room at 701 N D Street. They were kept in the glass curio-secretary that sat on the north side of the walnut library table. The big table took center place in a large window facing east to D street. She also kept her largest photographs, like this one in a drawer of the library table.

When my mother passed, it was several years before I could face a serious perusal of what was left of the family's

photograph collection. Grandpa K always warned grandma and mother to put the names, places, and dates on the photos-but neither of them did much of that. But this home appears in other photos, from ones with great-great grandma Mary LONGLAND Wood Elliott in her 90's. One shows her in her rocker on the porch, and her in the yard near the home next to a bush and vine. And yet another of my grandma and grandpa K standing at the screened porch at the rear of the home. And the Hughes-Hickman pre-family reunion photo was also taken around the rock in April of 1916.

I sat as a child listening to grandma and grandpa K, sitting in the dining room on D street, talking about their families, and the wonderful antiques that great grandma Curl had in her home. I know my mother spoke of the 5" wide hand-carved wooden picture frames that held the matching wedding portraits of JT and Jennie S, and the one of her grandma as a matron lady. And I did see some of the marvelous old china and decorative pieces that survived the family's advancing poverty after JT's death in 1918.

It seemed JT didn't teach great-grandma Jennie S to handle the property he had amassed in his years in Warren co. since their arrival here between the 1880 census in Washington co., and grandma's birth here in 1884. The young couple had followed his parents and siblings from Brimfield to 76, and then struck out on their own for the greener pastures of Warren co. Year by year they lost what he had, and were downsized-all that is left-is this photograph of the beautiful Victorian home "on the highway" in Indianola.

Div 58 – Ancestral Church, School Building or Organization Photo – Blue Ribbon to Donna Anderson

My Father's family church was First Lutheran Church, 511 Des Moines Street, Des Moines, Iowa. The children were christened and confirmed in the church. My grandmother, Emma P. Benson came to America in 1903 from Sweden. She lived with her Uncle Ben Holtman at 611 East 2nd Street. This was not far from the Swedish Evangelical Lutheran Church (Est. 1886) that conducted services in Swedish. Grandma eventually learned American English, but spoke with a heavy accent.

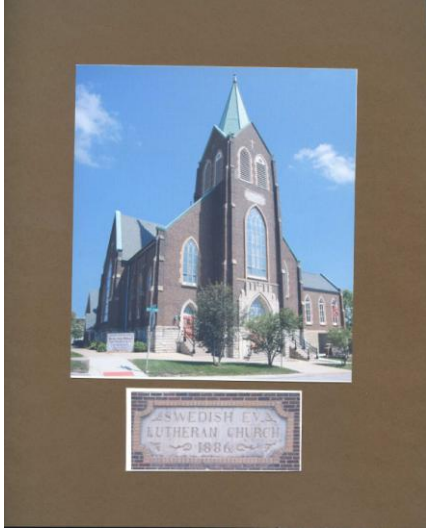
I'm not sure when the name changed to First Lutheran, this is the only name I knew for the church. The church name changed again in 2000 to Capitol Hill Lutheran.

Church Building History.

The land at E. Fifth and Des Moines streets was purchased by First Lutheran Swedish congregation in 1885 for \$5,000. The plans specified that the building was to be built in traditional Gothic style, was to seat 1,000 people, and was to be 90 feet long with an extension of 18 feet at the east end for the organ and choir.

Mr. J. A. Carlson was elected superintendent of construction. Carlson had been a shipbuilder in Sweden before immigrating to the U.S., and he felt he could design an arched roof that would give all the necessary strength by reversing the principle used in laying the keel of a ship. This accounts for the high vaulted ceilings of the sanctuary.



The cornerstone was laid July 4, 1886. Many members volunteered their time and professional skills to cut stone for the building. Artist Olaf Selindh, who was responsible for many of the windows in the Iowa State Capitol, designed the church's stained glass windows. The total cost of the church when completed was \$35,000.

The building was used for the first time on August 21, 1887.

Div 59 – Land Document – Red Ribbon to Brenda King

This is a warranty deed dated March 27, 1905. In this deed it lists my paternal great, great grandfather and mother, Fielden and Mary Clark, selling land to my great grandfather, Charles Clark. This was a year before both of their deaths (Fielden and Mary) and I think that Fielden wanted to make sure that Charles had ownership of it. It was listed as being sold for \$1 for 14 ¾ acres. There has been letters between Charles and his siblings, after their parents death, proposing that Charles had gotten everything before and after their deaths. I think that the parents had been in poor health and wanted to take care of some of this before anything happened. There has been arguments between siblings over this matter. I have found other land documents that shows dealings between father and son, but some were for more money than this one. What I like also about this document is that it has signatures from my great, great grandfather and has my great, great grandmother's mark.

Div 59 - School, Church or Organization Records – Blue Ribbon to Donna Crow

The Truro Christian Church was founded in the winter of

1856 by a small group that had mostly come to Iowa from Tuscarawas County, Ohio. This church congregation is still going & in 2006 had a sesquicentennial celebration. I had been “appointed” church historian by the former minister. As such, I was “nominated” to write a small history that we could copy for a handout. I asked every Sunday for people to share photos, memories, etc. I got very little response at first & started scouring through what was left of church records (the oldest were from the 1950's & marked “transferred” from original). I went to the conference office & there found a mimeographed copy of the church history that had been written in 1956 to celebrate 100 years. I started writing & used other resources (see book bibliography). Eventually, word got around & memorabilia came to me. One Sunday afternoon, a man called up & said he had stuff I could copy. He came to the house, I scanned the items, took a few notes & he was gone. Others were more trusting & left items with me to be returned at a later date. We also took all the book photos plus others and made a slide show for the special day of celebration. I feel that I learned a lot in writing this book. One of the good ideas were the dates in bold type. In the future, I will let someone else proofread and edit. All in all, I was very happy with the results. And was very proud when other members of the community commented on the professionalism of the Truro Congregational UCC Church history booklet.

Div 60 – Time Line – Blue Ribbon to Virginia Wheeldon

Timeline for Susan Phoebe Wheeldon Gilbert

My father-in-law always referred to his great-grandfather's sister as Aunt Phoebe. It wasn't until quite some time after I began my family tree research that I learned her name was Susan Phoebe. From information I have found, apparently she was called Phoebe most of her childhood and Susan as an adult. Aunt Phoebe was born in 1859 near Hartford, Iowa, the youngest child of my husband Leroy's great-great-grandparents Elijah Benedict Wheeldon (1812-1893) and Elizabeth Banister Norris (1812-1897). Aunt Phoebe died in 1938 in Des Moines, Iowa.

Much of Phoebe's life was spent on farms between Hartford and Des Moines and the area northwest of Avon, Iowa. In registering the births of some of her children, that area is referred to as Levy, Polk County, Iowa. She saw many changes in transportation, home comforts with electricity and household equipment, many states added to enlarge the USA, wars where she lost family members, changes in the White House, and entertainment.

I wonder if our future generations will be able to find as many changes if they ever decide to look back on our lifetime.

Home is where your stories begin

I remember...

- * Pop, usually Pepsi or 7-Up, & popcorn while watching the Walt Disney movie on Sunday evenings.
- * Setting up the projector & screen to watch home movies as a special treat. (We always wanted to see the clip of Dad shaking hands with a real Indian.)
- * Sledding on the big snow drifts south of the house. Making snow forts & caves in ditches along the lane. Dad sledding down the hill to the flat, the sled stopped, Dad didn't. We all wanted to LAUGH, but waited to see if he thought it was funny first.
- * Riding on a tractor with Dad – sitting on a fender, standing on the hitch or riding on the blade.
- * Mom taking us to meet Dad on his lunch break at a park – often South, Memorial, or Moats in Indianola, or Lake Ahquabi. Mom making picnic lunches at home. Building the brown picnic table.
- * The Hoover Fairs – We used to try to put on with games & contests & exhibitions. Usually Mom was our only visitor/participant.
- * The Shale Pile – All the great rocks & shale pieces with hundreds of fossils in them. Several times Raffalina climbed to the top but couldn't seem to get herself back down & I'd have to go up the pile and lead her down.

Div 62 Class 38 – Historical Poster of Lost Art– Blue Ribbon to Cathy Miller

The settlement and development of Iowa and the Victorian period (roughly 1840-1910) makes grave marking symbols a beauty to enjoy and an area of study.

Non-native species of trees were planted, lagoons created, shrubs and flowers introduced, and the whole atmosphere

was much like a park as a place for graves. Parks were uncommon at the time, people used the cemeteries as a place to gather for a Sunday afternoon visiting a family plot and may include a picnic lunch or tea at the site. Fences and gates set one plot off from another, benches made for sitting, walkways for strolling, and driveways for leisurely driving in good weather to admire the botanical specimens throughout the cemetery.

Tombstone Symbols and Messages Carved in Stone

Grave Marker Symbolism

- * An anchor signifies hope.
- * A broken ring symbolizes that the family circle has been severed.
- * Cherubs are angelic and signify innocence.
- * Fruits signify eternal plenty as the fruit of life.
- * Harps represent praise to the God.
- * Hands praying are asking god for eternal life.
- * A hand or finger pointing down represents God's hand pointing to you as the chosen one.
- * Hands clasped together mean farewells, friendship, the bond of marriage or an earthly and heavenly bond.
- * Two joined hearts on a stone mark a married couple.
- * Ivy stands for friendship and also immortality.
- * Laurel is a symbol of worldly accomplishment and heroism.
- * Lilies are the virgins' flower and the symbol of innocence and purity.
- * A morning glory signifies the beginning of eternal life.
- * Oak leaves and acorns stand for power, authority or victory and are often seen on military tombs.

- * Palm branches signify victory and rejoicing.
- * Pine cones and pine trees signify the cedars of Lebanon and suggest immortality or everlasting life.
- * Poppies represent eternal sleep.
- * Roses signify completion and the brevity of earthly existence.
- * A rose in full bloom means the deceased died in the prime of life.
- * A rosebud indicates a life lost in youth or a young life cut short.
- * A rod and staff are used to bring comfort for the bereaved.
- * Rosemary and thistles stand for remembrance. Thistles can also mean the deceased is of Scottish descent.
- * Stars and stripes around an eagle represent eternal vigilance and liberty and are often seen on military markers.
- * A tree stands for life. A sprouting tree stands for life everlasting. A tree trunk stands for the brevity of life, life cut down too soon or in the prime of life.
- * An urn with a flame symbolizes eternal life or undying remembrance.
- * Weeping willow trees depict perpetual mourning or grief.
- * Wheat stalks or sheaves represent the divine harvest and also the bread of eternal life.

Treestump Tombstones

- * Typically, a section of "bark" appears to have been peeled back, leaving space for carving.
- * Tombstones carved in the shape of a treestump appeared as early as 1840, and the tradition survived until at least mid-twentieth century. Markers may vary in height from fourteen inches to over eight feet.
- * Carvers often added ornamentation to symbolize personality traits, habits, occupations, or hobbies of the deceased.
- * Carvers generally chose Bedford limestone, quarried between Bloomington and Bedford, Indiana.

Subscription Websites for Genealogy Research

Are you considering a subscription to another website? Genealogy websites have been springing up like weeds. How do we know whether we should buy another subscription? The following are my suggestions for evaluating whether you should consider any subscription.

- 1) Go to the website under consideration and poke around as much as the website will allow.
 - a) Is a training video available?
 - b) What is the primary website content/specialty, is it transcriptions or images of the actual records or documents?
 - c) How do the search engines work, exact matches, or soundex results, does it allow for Boolean searches?
 - d) Can you print AND save documents?
 - e) Do you need any special programs to view documents, i.e., Flash Player, Adobe Acrobat?
 - f) Does the company offer a trial period? If you use it, be sure to note whether you have to specifically cancel prior to the end of the trial period.
 - g) Does the membership include any perks, i.e., newsletters, FAQ, and/or "contact us" section?
 - h) Is the company continuing to add more of the records you are interested in?
 - 2) Use a search engine to find reviews of the website under consideration. Try searches like "Evaluating subscription websites for genealogy research" and "genealogy websites", etc. Is the website you are considering in any of these lists? If so, what do the reviewers have to say about this website? If not, why do you suppose the website is not included?
 - 3) Make a list of your current subscriptions. Note the date of renewal, the cost for renewal, and calculate the monthly cost for the subscription. Add the information about the website under consideration and determine how it fits into your budget.
 - 4) Investigate whether your local library, a nearby Family History Library, or other research facility has a subscription that you can use onsite. Then, analyze whether the expense and convenience (or inconvenience) of going to that facility is more or less than having your own subscription for use at midnight in your pajamas.
 - 5) Consider whether you can obtain access to the website through a different membership. For example, some state genealogy societies and some libraries have subscriptions to various databases and allow remote access to these databases through a membership or a library card. Sometimes a single membership can give you access to several databases, thus saving you money in the long run.
- Carefully analyzing the website under consideration may save you much frustration and wasted money, and will make you a more knowledgeable and satisfied user.
